

**RESOLUTION NO. R2014.158**

**A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPE, ARIZONA, AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SALT RIVER PIMA-MARICOPA INDIAN COMMUNITY AND THE CITY OF TEMPE FOR THE DISBURSEMENT OF A PORTION OF ITS ANNUAL 12% MONIES FROM GAMING PROCEEDS.**

WHEREAS, Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) § 11-951 through § 11-954, provide that public agencies may enter into intergovernmental agreements for the provision of services or for joint or cooperative action; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tempe (“Tempe”) is empowered by Tempe City Charter to enter into this Agreement and has authorized the undersigned to execute this Agreement on behalf of Tempe; and

WHEREAS, the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community (“SRPMIC”) is authorized to enter into and execute this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the SRPMIC desires to convey to Tempe a portion of its annual 12% local revenue-sharing contribution required to be paid to local governments for the benefit of the general public pursuant to Section 12(d) of the Compact between the State of Arizona and the SRPMIC to support programs set forth in Exhibit “A”.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TEMPE, ARIZONA, as follows:

The City Council authorizes the Mayor to execute the Intergovernmental Agreement between SRPMIC and Tempe, on file with the City Clerk’s office.
